A question of translation

As the only officially bilingual province in Canada, New Brunswick is unique. The majority of Federation members speak and read English, but we would like to be able to reach more French speakers and readers.

We wanted to take this opportunity to address the reasons behind our not having simultaneous translation at our AGM and get some feedback from the membership on your position.

We had planned to have simultaneous translation at the AGM but the only available translator that we could find would not work without a translation booth. Large rooms cause sound distortion which adds to the challenge of simultaneously translating. We looked into this possibility but the cost was \$4000 for the equipment on top of the \$1500

for the translator, so we opted for having translation on-line only. At the beginning of the event, we had one person online who might have used this feature but they were not using translation and so the translator agreed to only charge us for the one hour that he worked.

This is the challenge that we face, providing service in two languages vs being judicious with our limited resources. The cost of full simultaneous translation for the AGM would have been almost 70% of the revenue from annual membership fees.

Our current language policy is "As much as possible NBFWO will strive to provide service in both official languages. Policy/legal documents will be

officially translated."

We would like to know our member's thoughts on the following:

- Is the current language policy acceptable? If not, what should it be?
- Is having bilingual service more important than maintaining low membership fees / event fees? If so, where is the balance?
- Are members open to increasing the annual membership fee? If so, by how much?

Since becoming a member-based organization the Board has revisited these discussions regularly. As always we strive to provide the best service possible to members utilizing the resources that we have.

A Message from the Executive Director

In the last month NBFWO has been part of an application to prepare for FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) Certification. We are working with private woodlot organizations in NS and PEI and are looking to expand the NS certificate to the Maritimes. We are applying under the Nature Smart Climate Solutions from Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC). This certificate or some form of certification is important to the sale of carbon credits. This work will start in January. We are also hopeful that we will receive funding to continue our climate adaptation work in January.

I travelled to Ottawa in October and had 12 meetings over 2 days with federal government staff and MPs. The NBFWO is a part of the Canadian Forest Owners (CFO), and as national group we lobbied for the adoption of our Personal Silviculture Savings and Investment Plan into the 2024 federal budget. This plan would allow woodlot owners to place some of their harvest revenues into a registered plan that would be sheltered from tax and could then be withdrawn to pay for future silviculture work. We are hopeful that NRCan, ECCC and Rural Economic Development will include our ask in their letters of request to the finance minister. We, Canadian Forest Owners, are following up with letters to Minister Freeland, Wilkinson and Hutchings. NBFWO will be following up with our own letter and other provincial associations will be asked to do the same. We are also hoping to be able meet with provincial MPs to push for our ask.

We are continuing to work on the structure document that was presented at the AGM and I will be presenting at the **Natural Climate Solutions for Carbon Sequestration Workshop** next week and at the Climate Change Adaptation Conference hosted by NBEN. Both are great opportunities to promote the good work that private woodlot owners do and the contribution they make to the environment.

Our annual <u>year-end survey</u> is now in progress. You should have received a ink in your email to access it online. Member participation in this survey is key to directing the future of the Federation and your participation is greatly appreciated.



We received a grand total of 2 responses! One yes and one no.














