- project development.




If you are interested in being on one of these committees, or in more information about them, please reach out.





A Hardwood Highlight - NHRI

The Northern Hardwoods Research Institute (NHRI) in Edmundston was founded in 2012 as a "partnership between the forest sector, governments and academia". They conduct applied research in order to "provide the forest sector with the knowledge and tools required to ensure the growth and sustainability of northern hardwood and mixedwood forests."



The focus of their work is primarily aimed on helping their industrial forestry partners "develop and implement solutions aimed at improving yield, and quality, of timber production. Other forest values (ecosystem services, habitat, biodiversity etc.) are certainly important, but not within NHRI's operational scope."²

Their work is limited to Eastern Canada and the Northeastern United States, as the tools they develop are specifically for forests within the current range of sugar maple.

The NHRI website, www.hardwoodsnb.ca, has much more information about their research and activities than could be shared in a short article, but if you are interested in learning about hardwood research in our region, you may want to consider signing up for their newsletter, The Leaflet. Some of the writing can be a bit on the technical side, however, most is relatable for the average woodlot owner. The latest issue, for Summer 2025, showcases research conducted on thinning hardwoods. Articles on "Growing Value Means Thinning Early and Often - Like carrots in a garden, trees need space to grow-thin early, thin often". and "Thinning the Line - How smart density decisions shape stronger forests".

You can find their newsletter on the Resources tab of their website, along with Technical Notes, Guides, Reports and more.

For the hardwood enthusiast, the NHRI has the information you need!

Nature Identification Guides

Nature NB has created series of guides about New Brunswick's wildlife and trees, perfect for downloading or printing and taking on a walk around your woodlot.

The 'Trees' guide contains 13 commonly found tree species, each with a picture of the leaves, bark and seeds, its maximum height, an interesting fact, and where you can expect to see them.

The wildlife guides have pictures of each species, habitat descriptions, and more interesting facts. Did you know the caterpillar of the Red Admiral butterfly eats nettles, including stinging nettles?! Or, that Spring Peepers can change colour in as little as 15 minutes?

iNaturalist Canada has some new initiatives that aim to highlight important, rare and endangered species in Canada. This <u>iNaturalist.ca Priority Species</u> umbrella project was created to help fill knowledge gaps across Canada

for species that are either rare in iNaturalist, experts have classified as data deficient, or are awaiting at risk status assessments. Here are some projects under this umbrella:



1 global observation in Canada

Species that have only one iNaturalist observation in the world, with that observation being in Canada. This list is updated monthly: additional previously unobserved species are turning up in Canada, some species have already been found more than once, and many still need your help to find a second one (and hopefully lots more!). Data deficient species in Canada

Species lacking enough information to determine their conservation status. By observing and documenting these lesser-known species, you can help fill critical knowledge gaps and support future conservation decisions.

Species at risk in Canada

Find out what species are endangered, their distribution and contribute valuable information. <u>Learn more</u>

For your safety and theirs, be sure to observe wildlife responsibly, especially for species at risk which may be legally protected – never harass or harm a species and be sure to leave their habitat undamaged.

iNaturalist Canada is led by the Canadian Wildlife Federation (CWF) along with NatureServe Canada and Parks Canada. Their goal is to encourage the use of iNaturalist.ca as a tool to track biodiversity across the country and connect Canadians to nature; while the creators at iNaturalist.org oversee the tech side of things and manage the platform on a global scale.
